LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Creating and operationalising a Hospital Trust at one of the biggest tertiary-level, academic, public hospitals in Cape Town, amidst the challenges of the COVID pandemic, required resilience and determination. From the organisational setup of the GSH Trust, to building our identity and branding, our supporter database, and securing our first strategic funding partners for our priority projects, none of our accomplishments would have been possible without the unflappable support of my Board of Trustees, GSH Executive Management and Hospital Facility Board, and most importantly, you – our steadfast supporters.

Despite being operational for only 3 years, the impact we have created and the funds raised are nothing short of remarkable. 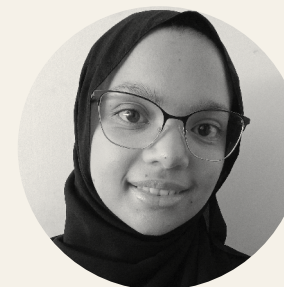

OUR JOURNEY

Creation of a Sustainable Organisation

Established finance, HR, governance and compliance policies, branding and marketing, philanthropic giving systems, and programs to ensure a solid foundation for implementation of impactful healthcare initiatives at GSH.

Securing of Critical Funding Partners

Ensured successful grant acquisition from the Harry Crossley Foundation for the Diabetes Centre, Gift of the Givers and Hike to Heal community group for Surgical Recovery, Standard Bank for GBV screening, and Wheel to Heal for the Oncology department renovations, as well as hundreds of donations from individuals and businesses exemplifies our ability to enable projects and innovations otherwise unattainable due to constrained budgets.

Success of Priority Projects

- Surgical Recovery Project - 2800 catch-up operations completed (as of end of January 2024)
- Diabetes Centre - close to 500 health care workers trained in basic and advanced diabetes care
- GBV intervention - 8000 women patients screened for violence at home with support and referrals as needed. Over 260 health care workers training in GBV detection and referral support
- Refurbishments for Kangaroo Mother Care rooms, Oncology department chemotherapy room upgrades and Gynaecology casualty all underway

Crowdfunding for Impact

Through public fundraising events and crowdfunding, GSH Trust involved the community and displayed its collaborative approach, raising over R400,000 from events such as Sanlam Marathon, CT Cycle Tour, Two Oceans Marathon, and the Comrades Marathon in 2022/2023.

Fostering of Strategic Partnerships

Created and maintained critical partnerships and collaborations with numerous Corporates, NGOs and stakeholders such as: Adidas, Everseason, FCB, Hike2Heal, Kolisi Foundation, MOSAIC, Nahana Foundation, Seattle Coffee, Wheel to Heal and so many more.

Enhanced Profile and Media Recognition

Demonstrating collaboration, GSH Trust garnered community involvement with groups like Wheel to Heal Cycle and Hike to Heal, while securing extensive media coverage, thereby expanding our reach and impact as well as the Hospital profile.

Exponential Growth in Donor Engagement

GSH Trust's exponential growth in social media channels and donor database exhibited their ability to connect with supporters and demonstrate compassion to an ever-increasing audience.

Acquisition of Talent

By hiring dedicated employees including an Executive Director, a Fundraising & Marketing Coordinator, our first Project Coordinator, and healthcare practitioners, GSH Trust upheld its value of excellence, ensuring a skilled team capable of driving impactful projects.



OUR IMPACT



Gender Based Violence Screening Intervention

In South Africa, one-third of women and girls 15 years and older have experienced physical or sexual intimate partner violence. Although it is more common than HIV or breast cancer, intimate partner violence is not well understood – even by those working in healthcare. Providers generally lack a clear understanding of the condition and how to detect it. Screening for intimate partner violence is also far from routine. Most medical and nursing schools are not adequately preparing students to identify and manage intimate partner violence.

The GSHT is tackling this gap by universally screening patients across the hospital and training healthcare practitioners so that they are well-prepared to identify intimate partner violence and support those women who are at high risk or experiencing it.

In pilot phase 1, between 25 November and 10 December 2022,

the country's 16 Days of Activism, Groote Schuur Hospital screened every pregnant woman attending its antenatal clinics. During this first phase, some 305 pregnant women were screened and 10% were referred for support.

In pilot phase 2, the screening and referral intervention was rolled out to maternity, gynaecology and trauma services in June 2023. The GSHT hired 9 new staff members – including a project coordinator, 5 screening nurses and 3 social workers. As of mid-February 2024, almost 8000 women patients have been screened for violence at home – of which 13.5% are experiencing violence. 40% of the patients experiencing violence opt-in for onsite counselling services – and half of those survivors are referred to external NGO stakeholders for ongoing support.

Nakita Verkijk

Nakita is a Genetic Counsellor at GSH, who attended the GBV detection and referral pathway training on Tuesday, 3rd October 2023. She chose to attend the voluntary healthcare worker training as she highlighted that she often encounters patients experiencing violence at home and hoped to gain more skills in this area. Nakita explained that “the training provided valuable information about the GBV screening intervention and tool, and the support available for our patients affected by GBV at the

hospital. Having all of the resources explained in one setting and learning about community based organisations that provide services for GBV survivors, was invaluable.” She found the training very valuable and recommended it for all patient-facing staff at GSH. “Understanding how to identify GBV, how to talk to our patients about the violence they are experiencing, and having the confidence to know that we have the correct information to offer them help is a deep relief.”

Diabetes Centre – Training and Education

At least 4.2 million South Africans live with diabetes – the highest prevalence in Africa. For many, it's poorly controlled, putting them at risk of developing complications – all of which are preventable. These complications include blindness, kidney failure, stroke, cardiovascular disease and amputations. In recent years, diabetes was the second leading underlying cause of death in the country.

In 2021, Groote Schuur Hospital launched its Diabetes Centre. It is the first public healthcare centre in Africa to offer people living with diabetes access to all members of their multi-disciplinary team under one roof and at one appointment. It provides a range of services, clinics, education, training, research

and outreach. The Diabetes Centre will act as a fulcrum for building a hub of excellence for diabetes-related primary care in the Western Cape. Adding a foot care unit will help reduce the need for amputations and their huge human and economic costs.

Thanks to a three-year grant from the Harry Crossley Foundation in 2022, the Diabetes Centre has been able to train over 600 healthcare workers in the last two years, throughout the Western Cape in basic and advanced diabetes care. As each healthcare worker interacts with thousands of patients each year – the impact of this upskilling is immense in patient care and the fight against diabetes.

Sister Nell

Sister Nell is an operational manager at GSH Maxillo-Facial, Oral and Dental Department. She attended one of the four-day advanced diabetes training programs offered by the Diabetes Centre at GSH. As 25% of patients who attended GSH at any one time suffer from diabetes, she explains that this course is vital for all healthcare workers to attend. She explains that “the course provided a realistic and relatable understanding of a balanced lifestyle and the effects of food on the body.” It allowed her to become more aware of her own eating habits, and is now able to promote

a balanced diet at home and at the hospital to her staff and patients. She understands the signs and symptoms of diabetes and what to do, should she encounter this in one of her patients. Sister Nell highly recommends the course to healthcare professionals and believes it should be accessible to non-healthcare individuals as well, considering the burden of diabetes in South Africa as a whole.



OUR IMPACT CONT.



Surgical Recovery Project

When COVID-19 hit, resources at hospitals across the world were re-directed away from other needs towards addressing the crisis. Elective surgical care ground almost to a halt, creating a massive backlog of surgeries that is now taking years to clear.

Tragically, surgeries that might not have been urgent in 2020 have become more and more so. Thousands of patients are waiting for surgeries that will alleviate chronic pain, prevent blindness and remove cancer – among other things. While they wait, they suffer; some deteriorate beyond help or die.

Elective surgical care is a crucial and scarce resource in the public sector. GSH wanted to scale up our service to help clear the backlog and perform life-changing surgeries. To do this, we harnessed the hospital's refurbished Day Surgery Suite (E4), which was designed to accommodate additional surgical slates pre-COVID

but wasn't commissioned due to the pandemic.

This project began performing surgeries in May 2022. As of the beginning of February 2024, thanks to generous donations from our major funding partner, Gift of the Givers, and hundreds of individuals and businesses, we have funded and enabled over 2800 additional elective surgeries on top of the usual number of operations completed annually.



Phumza Nkwenkwezi

Phumza witnessed her confident son Azola suffer a life-altering accident that resulted in the loss of his bottom lip. After years of suffering with the consequences of the accident and his self-esteem slipping away, Azola received reconstructive surgery at GSH through the Surgical Recovery project. Despite initial fears, the surgery was successful, and Azola regained his confidence and his beautiful smile. Phumza shares

that "she has been with her son since day one and the surgery changed his life." Phumza got her son back. This remarkable story reminds us that the health of one family member affects the entire household ecosystem. It also highlights the impact that surgical interventions can have on restoring the human spirit, livelihoods and family systems.

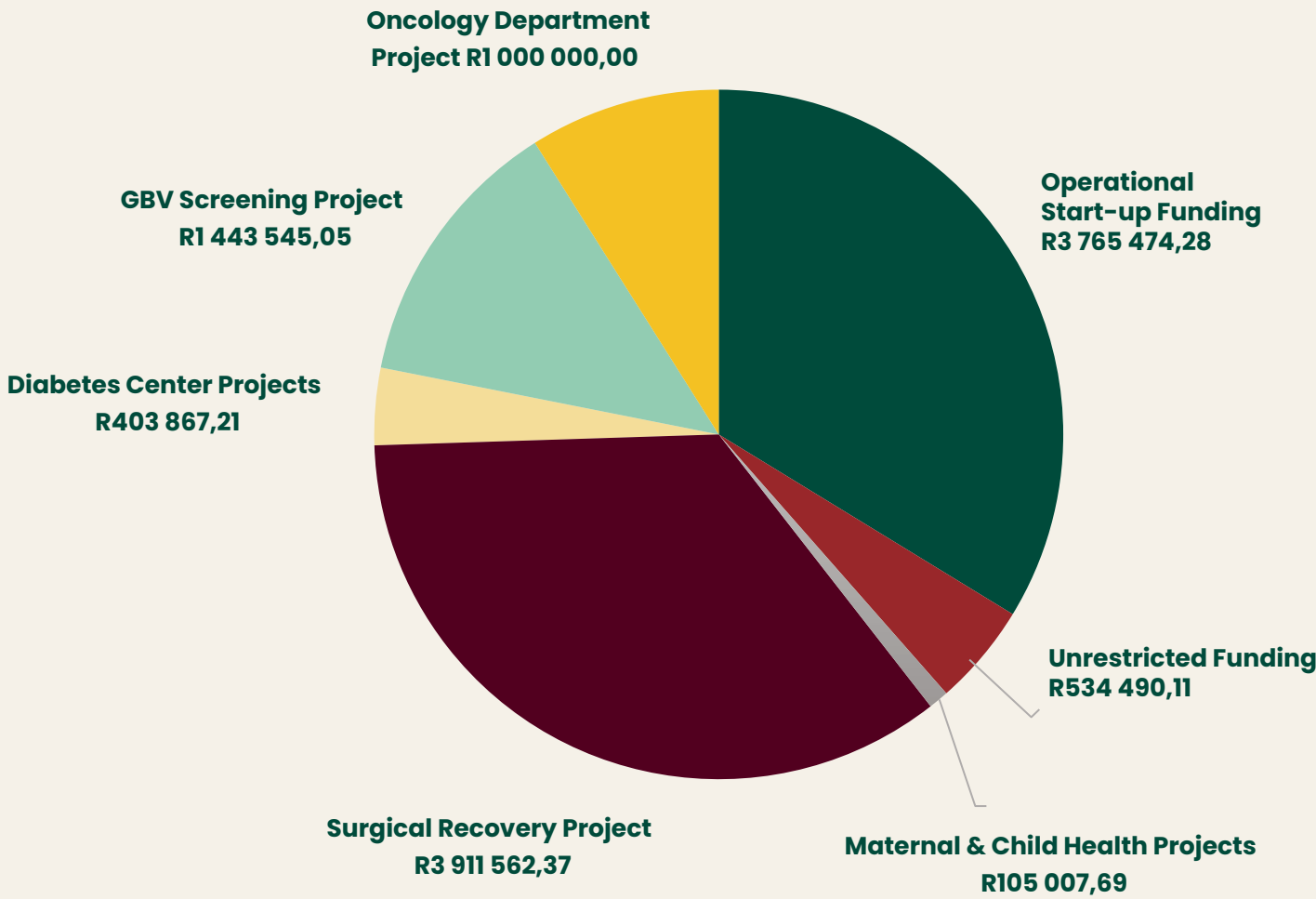

Year One & Two (2021–2023)

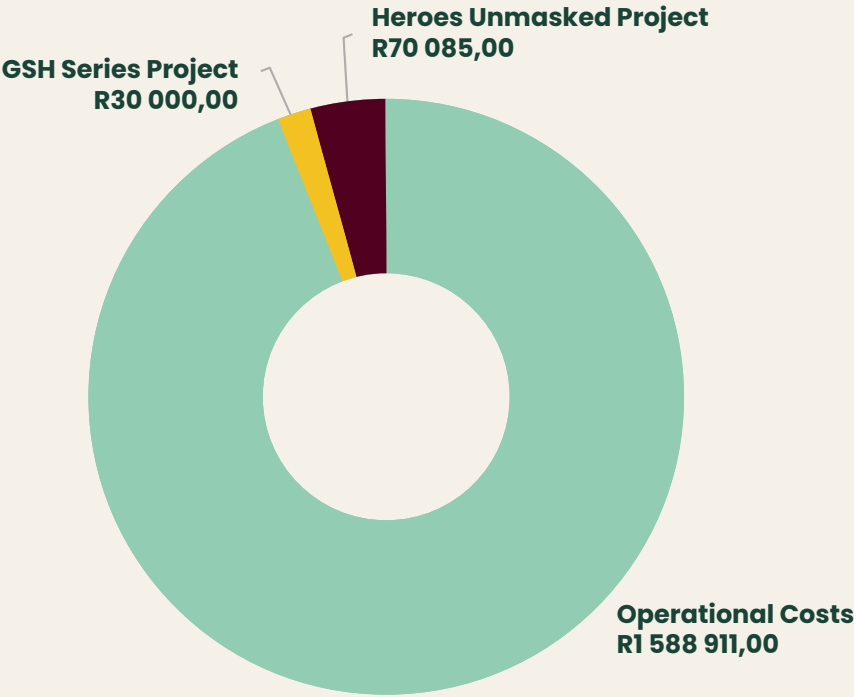
